Annual Meeting

Approved funding for honoree tickets to attend Pioneer Program award event ticket (1+) beginning 2022.

Annual Meeting Long Range

Accepted bid from WDGA to have 2024 Annual Meeting and Convention at the Grand Geneva Resort in Lake Geneva Wisconsin, October 19-24

Awards

Accepted two historic herds: Perfection – Sally & Gordon Callahan and Rockspring – Ann Miller Weikel

Constitution and By-laws

Constitution amendment requested to forward to the membership on electronic voting in elections. Bylaw changes were accepted contingent upon the outcome of the vote on the constitutional changes.

Constitution amendment requested to forward to the membership on verbiage regarding the changes from Secretary-Treasurer or Association Manager to Executive Director. Bylaw changes were accepted contingent upon the outcome of the vote on the constitutional changes.

Emergency Management Task Force

Approved the hiring of a full time Senior Accountant and a full time Project Manager and acceptance of the organization restructuring plan

Finance

- Approved engaging a management consulting service for a maximum of 90 days
- Approved additional EC travel to Spindale
- Approved providing the authority to review and approve the 2021 tax return to be filed with the Department of the Treasury, Internal Revenue Service by the November 15, 2022 due date.
- Approved the authority to pursue financing options giving designated members of the EC signatory authority
- Approved the authority to provide access to financial records by appropriate individuals
- Approved authority to obtain appropriate legal representation
- Approved authority to the President be added to financial accounts until a permanent administrative manager is hired.
- Approved that both President and PPM are bonded by insurance for their financial responsibilities.

Recipe Corner Festive Goat Cheese Christmas Present Appetizers

Ingredients:

12 rice crackers 3 chives 4 oz herbed goat cheese 2 oz curly parsley leaves 12 pink peppercorns Equipment: 1 1/2" square cookie cutter small spoon kitchen scissors toothpick



Directions:

1. Place a 1 1/2" square cookie cutter in the center of a rice cracker. Spoon about 1 1/2 tsp herbed got cheese onto the cookie cutter, and evenly fill it to the sides.


2. Use a small spoon or a finger to press and gently ease the cookie cutter up, leaving a nice goat cheese square.

3. Use kitchen scissors to cut a chive into 2 pieces that are the length of the square. Lay one down in the center and cut one of them in half, and place on the sides to make a cross.

4. Carefully, stock a teeny, tiny bit of goat cheese to a pink peppercorn.

5. Place the peppercorn in the center of the chive "ribbon." It will stick easier than you think it will.

6. Add 2 teeny, tiny parley leaves on the sides. I find it's helpful to use a toothpick or cocktail pin to press them into the cheese Reprinted from http://shekeepsalovelyhome.com



ALBA Specialty Rules

1. The AMERICAN LAMANCHA BREEDERS ASSOCIATION authorizes one LaMancha Specialty show per year per ADGA district for a maximum total of 8 shows per year All applications must be electronically received by **December 31** of the current year to be considered. Hosting shows will be notified as soon a possible after 1/1. Shows applying must have a minimum of 3-5 LaMancha breeders that have shown in previous years.

2. The show must be an ADGA Sanctioned show and open to all members.

3. In order to host a specialty show results (3 placings per class as well as champions) and pictures of all first place winners as well as all champions, reserves and best of breeds as well as best udder and outstanding youth winner and showmanship winners must be sent to the Webmaster within 30 days of the show. Photos MUST be sent in ELECTRONIC format only. A flash drive will be provided with show awards and all results (photos and results) must be mailed to the chair on the drive and in the envelope provided.

4. In accordance with our club goals of promoting youth, our club **REQUIRES** that a younger and older outstanding youth. f you do not feel you can fulfill these requirements, please don't apply for a specialty. Only shows that recognize youth participation and have returned their results at previous shows in a timely manner will be considered for a specialty.

5. The ALBA will furnish awards for all GCH and RGCH winners and Best of Breed in does and bucks. We will also furnish a Best Udder medal and an outstanding youth award as well as showmanship awards. Certificates for winners will be furnished if requested on your application.

6. If your show has split dates, (does on one date, bucks at a later time/location) it will be considered 2 separate shows. Please include both a regular fee and a buck show fee (\$125). If applying for a buck show only specialty, the fee is \$50. Fee for a regular show is \$100. (Sr/Jr/Buck) A Sr/Jr show is \$75.

7. Please include the name of your contracted judge prior to submitting your application. We will not award a specialty without that information.

8. Applications are accepted from October 1 to December 31. Please submit your application ONLINE at <u>www.lamanchas.org</u>. There is a link on the home page and submit deposit by using the Paypal link.

9. These rules and application can be changed at any time at the discretion of the ALBA President, Board of Directors and Specialty Chair.

10. Shows that have hosted may not host again for 2 years. Also shows that have not submitted full results in a timely manner, have not chosen both a jr and sr outstanding youth and/or have not returned both the memory key with results and any unused awards will NOT be considered for future shows for a minimum of 3-5 years.

1. To be eligible for nomination, all of the following must apply:

- a) Recorded Grade animals MUST meet the ADGA breed standards for LaManchas
- b) An ALC member must be the current owner of the animal being nominated. Nominations are open to all ALC members in good standing (2022 dues current). Non-members may join ALC concurrently, providing that the \$15.00 annual membership fee is also enclosed. All payments must be submitted by Paypal before entry will be accepted.. Membership must be paid by the time the entries are submitted.
- c) Recorded Grade group classesall animals in group must be Rec. grades. Sire of animals in Jr. & Sr. Get class must be either Purebred LaMancha or Experimental LaMancha and must meet LaMancha breed standards.

2. Enclose \$3.00 for each entry (plus Paypal fees). Entries may be paid by submitting the correct fee via PayPal to <u>lamanchabreeders@gmail.com</u>. (Please use paypal link on home page of website.

3. Entries **MUST BE RECEIVED** by December 10 to be considered. This includes all payments as verified by Paypal account.

4. Two different views of the animal MUST be submitted - side and rear view. **Rear shots should show the entire animal, not just the udder.** The photographs must have been taken during the year for which the nomination is being made. N O T E : Photos sent in with **ANY identifying information will be returned**. Group class pictures must have been taken together. Group classes of Dairy Herd, Produce, Get of Sire and Dam & Daughter are rear shots ONLY.

5. NOTE: The All American program will be ONLINE and DIGITAL ONLY. Only digital photos will be accepted. Entries must be submitted online using the online entry form available on the home page of the ALBA website.

6. All photos become the property of ALBA archives.. Final entries need to be received December 10. Names of judges will be published after completion of competition. Because there is no way to know how many will enter, rather than deleting a class because of only one entry, we will post the number of entries in each class with the wins. A Reserve will be given in all classes unless there are only two animals and the 2nd place animal is not worthy. At least one judge would have to deem the animal unworthy at the time of judging.

7. Any Winning entry that has been found to be a misrepresentation of the actual animal will be officially removed from the list of winners and a correction will be published in the next issue of the LaMancha Club newsletter.

8. A Supreme Champion will be awarded to top doe and buck, unless there is a tie, in which case, no Supreme award will be granted unless approved by the ALBA BOD. A GCH entry will be awarded to two youth exhibitors in each youth category. One will be for GCH junior doe and one for GCH senior doe in each age category (total 4 youth recognized). Youth categories are younger youth of 14 and under and older youth 15 through their 21st birthday at time of show.
